## SOCIAL EVENTS

CATERED LUNCHESES: There will be catered lunches on Wednesday and Thursday, the two days of continuing education courses and workshops. A light lunch and sandwich buffet will assure everyone of a good meal in the relatively short break period. Restaurant facilities are somewhat limited in the immediate area.

### DRESS AND WEATHER

Dress in Park City is casual and, as Park City is in the mountains, fall weather can be cool during the daytime and quite crisp in the evening. Plan on bringing a coat for evening wear and at least a sweater for daytime. Sturdy boots/shoes are recommended for any hiking you might want to do.

### UTAH LIQUOR LAWS

There are several ways to obtain a drink in Utah. Our liquor laws are unique!

All liquor sales are made through state licensed stores. You must be 21 and cash is preferred. Most stores DO NOT accept checks or charge cards! (Travelers checks are OK.) All package agencies (where liquor is not consumed on the premises) are closed on Sundays and holidays. Many restaurants and hotels (Yarrow restaurant included) are licensed to sell mini-bottles and splits of wine. This is a "do-it-yourself" proposition, requiring the customer to purchase the liquor personally, then return to the table to order mixer or set-ups. Liquor purchased at a restaurant liquor store must be consumed on the premises in conjunction with a meal. Dining guides to Park City will indicate "mini-bottle license" if the restaurant has one. (Brown bags also permitted.)

There are many private clubs in Park City which sell wine, beer, mixed and blended drinks "over the bar" to members and guests of members. Memberships and guest memberships are available for a small fee to tourists and visitors. Many restaurants and private clubs offer liquor service on Sunday.

Beer is available at most restaurants, grocery and drug stores seven days a week. Bars sell beer only, but "brown bags" are permitted. There is a "set-up" charge.
